Magic Behaviour Training





All our staff have recently received Magic Behaviour Management training. The training focuses on prevention, support and skill development for staff, at all levels across our school, to support student's behavioural needs. Magic Behaviour

Management recognises that children are, indeed, children, still learning the way the world works and making mistakes as they go and our staff have been trained to guide them through this process.

Art and Design









Primary students learn how to use all kinds of different objects in and outside the classroom to create art pieces and structures. These activities and lessons support students' fine motor skills and challenges them to be creative in solving problems and producing excellent pieces of group and independent work.

Pupils enjoy the privilege of Golden Time on Thursdays each week. By completing all their classwork and tasks set, teachers and pupils join in the structured fun activities. The competitions range from table football, pool, snooker, ping pong, skipping contest etc.


Numeracy and Literacy

When pupils join us at Serenity School, they complete a baseline assessment in Numeracy and Litercay. Based on the results pupils are allocated in Band 1, Band 2 and Band 3. Band 1 and Band 2 means that pupils perform below their expected age for Maths and English. Students who are in Band 3 will be able to access to the Literacy and Numeracy curriculum independently.

Students in Band 1 receives 2 weekly 1:1 Numeracy and Literacy sessions of 25 minutes. Students in Band 2 take part in one 1:2 weekly session of 25 minutes.

Pupils who willingly engage in the Numeracy and Literacy intervention sessions and complete their work to a high standard and make good progress receives a £10 Amazon voucher.





Swimming



Pupils in Primary and KS3 do swimming once per week. They exercise and learning how being healthy can also help with their mental health whilst participating in our weekly swimming sessions.

All children showed progression in their swimming skills from the first week they started the sessions. Some children were very brave and ventured out swimming without their floats developing their confidence and self-belief in the water.

Crack the code




This term 'Crack the Code' represents pupils who consistently displaying our 5 School Core Principles throughout the week as detailed below:

We congratulate all of our pupils who have Cracked the Code this term.




3. The school curriculum engages my child in learning







4. The subjects taught by the school are exciting and innovative






5. The school prepares my child for the next stage of their learning

Though majority of our parents/carers have agreed with our provision, a small minority have disagreed that our subjects being taught are exciting and that their child is making good progress.


The school's response









8. My child is safe in school






9. The school has a positive, respectful culture in which my child is well cared for

Whilst the large majority of our parents/carers are in agreement with the questions above, there are a few who disagree about their child's safety and how behaviour is managed in school.


The school's response

Safeguarding our pupils is our top priority amongst all else. All staff receive termly certified safeguarding training, with interactive safeguarding scenarios every three weeks. Staff have recently been trained in Magic Behaviour Management approach, and we have expanded the number of staff working on our Behaviour for Learning Team to effectively manage pupils' behaviour.


11. The school has high expectations for my child







12. When I have raised concerns with the school they have been dealt with properly

Parents/Carers views

Parents overwhelmingly agreed that the school has high expectations for their child. However, a few stated that their concerns were not dealt with properly when raised, and fewer disagreed that the school supports their child's Personal Development.

The school's response

We have now employed a full-time member of staff in reception to respond to phone and email enquiries about any parental concerns. Information is passed to members of staff who will have a 24 hour time period to respond to all concerns and enquires. We take our pupil's personal development seriously, which has a similar weighting with other aspects of your child's development within our Socio Education Model. We provide a variety of personal development opportunities and track our pupils' engagement across a range of initiatives such as Work Experience, Career Advice, their Social Emotional Moral and Cultural aspects of learning during school assemblies etc.



Since we opened our doors in September 2020, Serenity School Eltham has doubled in size and capacity, and have now deepened our roots with various external agencies and Local Authorities. We have now embedded our performance in all aspects of our Socio Education Model. Our school is blessed with a community of staff and pupils who are truly remarkable and dynamic.
