COVID-19 FAQs for Parents and Carers

Over the past weeks, school life has changed dramatically. The rapid pace of recent changes has thrown up a wide range of uncertainties and questions for parents, students and members of the school community. This page has been put together to provide simple answers to the most important questions.

If you have a question, please first read the FAQs and, if having read them you are still unable to find an answer to your question, please do not hesitate to contact the school office

As we go through this challenging time, different questions and answers will arise and we will keep you updated as we receive new guidance.

I am worried that my child is vulnerable or that a family member is, should I send them back to school?

Clinically extremely vulnerable people are those considered to be at a higher risk of severe illness from coronavirus. A minority of children will fall into this category, and parents should follow medical advice if their child is in this category and contact the school.

How will you ensure increased safety? Personal Hygiene:

Staff give regular reminders on when and how to wash hands. Staff issue hand sanitizer as children enter the classroom after play and lunch break. Students will also be expected to sanitize their hands when they enter the dining hall and staff will remind them not to touch their eyes, nose and mouth with unwashed hands. Students will be reminded to cover their mouth and nose with a bent elbow, or use a tissue, when coughing or sneezing. If children sneeze or cough, they must wash their hands. There are posters around the school to remind children of expectations too.

What arrangement will be in place if a child or adult is unwell/showing symptoms of fever/cough?

All staff are aware of track and trace and we urge all parents to also be aware of the NHS check and trace service.

If your child has one of the following Covid-19 symptoms:-

- High temperature (this means they feel hot to touch on chest or back)
- A new continuous cough (this means coughing a lot more than an hour or 3 or more coughing episodes in 24 hours)
- A loss or change to your sense of taste or smell (this means they have noticed they cannot smell or taste anything)

Please do not come to school; self-isolate the whole household while getting the symptomatic person tested. If the test is negative, then please send them back into school.

We have supplied PPE for first aiders and any staff coming into close contact with pupils. We have sanitizer, gloves, aprons, masks and eye protection available for any staff who wish to use PPE.

What will happen if I don't send my children back to school?

The Government's guidance for parents makes clear that parents are expected to send their child to school. School is the best place for children to learn and for their mental wellbeing to have social interactions with their peers and teaches. Non-attendance will be marked as an absence.

Who can bring my child to School?

If adults do bring children to school, we would encourage only **one** parent bring them and to social distance outside the school. Only students will be allowed to enter the school grounds and only through the allocated entry point.

Who can pick up my child from School?

If your child does not walk home alone, please come alone as far as possible and keep your distance from other parents and staff. We do encourage adults to wear a face mask whilst on the school site. If your child is not collected 10 minutes after their collection time, they will be brought back to the main building.

How can I contact my child's Tutor?

Parents are expected to phone and email rather than visit. Any visit to the school must be made via appointment and will receive a copy of our visitors' policy. Appointments will not be made at the start and end of the day to maximise social distancing. When visiting the school office for an appointment, parents and visitors are to use the sanitizers and should remain within the marked spots in the reception area.

How will you ensure students social distance?

Students and staff will only mix in a consistent year group which will be referred to as that "bubble". That "bubble" will stay away from other people and year groups.

How we will help students and staff adjust?

Teachers have explained routines and expectations. All staff will reassure children that they are safe, and we are there to keep them safe as well as teach them. We have a strong focus of personal, social, health education and encourage open discussions around worries and feelings of being in school.

Students will be reminded they can talk to any adult if they have any anxiety; they can also visit the therapists in the quiet room to talk about any issues that might be worrying them.

How will we ensure safe access to fresh air outside of the classroom whilst ensuring students are a safe distance at break time?

We will have staggered break times so that each class can use the playground and grass area. The limited equipment that will be used by students will be thoroughly cleaned after use. Students will not share equipment. Students will not be allowed to play any contact sport.

Teachers will ensure classroom windows are open as much as possible to allow fresh air into the classrooms.

How will classrooms be set up?

We have removed some furniture and desks will be in rows forward facing – no children will be facing another student and therefore lowering risk.

No belongings from home can be brought to school; this includes playing cards, books, stickers, balls etc.
